# Studying Islam and Muslims: Trajectories and Futures of South African Scholarship

13-15 July 2021



The aim of this conference is to trace past and potential trajectories of Islamic studies scholarship in Southern Africa. It also seeks to honour the associated scholarly legacies that have developed in the last 40 years. Participants will reflect, in various ways, on their own journeys through the field; on research areas they have found, and continue to find, to be vital; on the institutional unfolding of the discipline in a South African tertiary context; on how other disciplines have spoken to, and continue to speak, to Islamic studies. In tracing central ideas that have developed within this body of scholarship, participants also cast a firm eye on current and future trends in the discipline and in the social sciences and humanities as they relate to the study of Islam as a whole. An important part of the conference will speak to these trends and the implications they contain for doing Islamic Studies, especially in a South African context.
