In this talk, the run-up, contextual setting, proceedings and products of the Town Planing exhibition of 1938 are described. The exhibition's relationship with the South African town planning profession, and its historical significance and impact, are discussed. The talk concludes with a brief engagement on the absence of major planning exhibitions since the 1938-event, despite the post-1994 'neve rea' of progressive planning bolicy, planning history, strategic planning, regional development and the interface between mining and settlement development. Over the last twenty-two years, Mark has authored and co-authored numerous academic papers, articles, chapters in books and technical reports and acted as a consultant to a number of national and provincial departments, municipalities, NGOs, planning commissions, science councils and private companies on a wide range of issue related to his above areas of interest.

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
