PAGEANTRY ARCHIVE

Pondering beauty sewn into a sleeve

SPRING QUEEN - The Staging of the Glittering Proletariat. Presented by The Centre for Curating the Archive. Curated by Dale Washkansky. At Iziko's Bertram House until August 24. **LUCINDA JOLLY** reviews

TWO WOMEN go into a clothing chain store, both to buy clothing. Their experiences in this instance will be vastly different.

For the one woman it will be simply the act of buying mass-produced clothing, clothing, that until worn by her, will remain impersonal.

For the other woman it will become a highly personal experience when she recognises with surprise, maybe even pleasure, that it was she who was responsible for stitching every single right sleeve on to the range of blouses that will be worn by hundreds of women. That she may not be able to afford the very piece she made is another story.

The work of the second woman is always invisible. There is no evidence or signature to indicate that it was her hands who made the right sleeve.

It's against this crushing anonymity that the *Spring Queen* pageant takes on its vital importance to both the women who populate the factory floors and the

communities where they originate. Hosted by the Southern African what Professor Anthony Bogues, the

Clothing and Textile Workers' Union (SACTWU), the pageant started in the politically fraught 1970s, when young "non-white" workers were joining the factories and were keen to enter the

The pageant presented a chance to move from the stifling uniformity of the factory floor and for a short period inhabit the rarefied atmosphere of the princess where the invisible is made dazzingly visible. It also provided a chance to unite and have fun after gruelling wage negotiations.

One of the largest of its kind in the world, the pageant begins as an in-house factory pageant from which 40 to 60 different queens are chosen to represent their factories and compete with each other in the Spring Queen competition. There can only be one SACTWU Queen and one first and one second princess, a Miss Personality and a Miss Best Dressed.

The exhibition Spring Queen provides a platform to unpack the pageant, which many are unaware of. It is the inspiration of Dr Siona O'Connell, who has a PhD on District Six and the issue of land claims. She is also curator at the Centre for Curating the Archive at UCT.

The ethos of the exhibition is a continuation of O'Connell's concern with

Harmon Family Professor of Africana Studies, terms the "archive of the ordinary". The success of the exhibition is precisely what happens, in O'Connell's words, "when the seemingly banal and mundane become extraordinary when pinpointed and focused upon".

The exhibition contextualises the pageant into "the larger historical narrative of South Africa". Rather than simply providing answers to questions, it also raises questions around the objectification of the woman participants, for example, and whether the goal of the

pageant is one of an illusory moment or something more sustainable.

The exhibition is a busy construction of photographs, moving testimonies by the various beauty queens - Bianca Jo-Ann Adams, Farieda Ebrahim, Mareldia April, Mariam Bird, Melissa Hendriks and Paegan Abrahams - and dresses worn by them, in particular the handpainted white silk dress worn by Adams.

The panels of the women's testimonies are less about winning the title and more about personal growth comments such as the pageant offers dalewashy@gmail.com

"workers something to be proud of" or "I was a very shy person... it allowed me to step out of my shell" and "it brought some excitement into my normal day-to-

Perhaps we who wear the clothes could now take some time to celebrate one of the highpoints in the lives of those who made them.



Seventh dance film fest at Baxter gets to the point

BEST described as a danced conversation between two dancers, their musicians and the public, Sacred Monsters was performed by Akram Khan and Sylvie Guillem and filmed live at

Dance enthusiasts can sit in on this conversation when it is screened today during s vear's *Baxter Dance Film Festival* Sacred Monsters is the second in a trilogy of *pas de deux* created by Anglo-Indian dancer and choreographer Khan in which both dancers recount their experiences of the

classical world in a solo of their own before joining in a duet. In between, they chat to each other and to the audience. In its seventh year, the *Baxter* **CONVERSING:** Sylvie Guillem and Dance Film Festival runs at the Golden Arrow Studio until Saturday at 7.30pm,

with a 5pm screening on Saturday.

Presented in association with Cinedans, a dance film festival in the Netherlands, and the Gordon Institute for Performing and Creative Arts (Gipca), the programme is designed to appeal to choreographers, directors, dancers, teachers, documentary and dance film lovers alike.

The fest began with Point Taken 2, which premiered at Cinedans last year The Point Taken interdisciplinary dance film project brings together four eightminute dance films comprising Spiegelingen by Marinus Groothof and Dunja Jocic, *One False Move* by Clara van Gool and Ria Marks, Evolutie van Soorten (Evolution of Species) by Esther Rots/Dan Geesin and Melissa Ellberger and Hypnogogia: The Borderland State by Frank Scheffer and Muhanad Rasheed. Also on the programme is Hans van

Manen's Creating Without Words. The multi-award-winning *Of Heart*

and Courage, directed by Arantxa Aguirre and produced by JL Lopez Linares, will be screened on Friday. It follows the Béjart Ballet Lausanne as they work to survive following the death of founder and principal choreographer Maurice Béjart. Béjart created works such as Rite of Spring, 9th Symphony,

The early performance on Saturday at 5pm is Wayne McGregor: Across the Threshold, directed by Nigel Wattis. The documentary profiles McGregor and includes discussions between him and English broadcaster Melvyn Bragg about how Covent Garden is embracing new directions in art and the relationship between traditional ballet and contemporary dance.

It sees McGregor create, rehearse and
